Honeywell International Inc. is the Air-Conditioning Maintenance contractor for the First Judicial Circuit. One of the conditions in the contract is to provide for a "satisfactory operation of the air-conditioning and ventilation system". Because of the age of AHU and increased volume of custodies in the cell block, Honeywell has recommended that the old inefficient 5 Ton AHU be replaced with the larger 7.5 Ton AHU which is the maximum size they feel can utilize the existing duct size and chilled water volume. Without contracting a Mechanical Engineer consultant, The Judiciary will have to assume the responsibility for specifying the recommended AHU (or equivalent with a notation that that the new unit must work with the existing duct size and chilled water volume) and leave it up to the bidders to specify their own recommendations for the new AHU. If this has to go out for HlePro bids, we would have to require that Honeywell International Inc. (The First Judicial Circuit's A/C Maintenance contractor) be listed as a sub-contractor to shut down the

6. Explain in detail why it is not practicable or not advantageous for the Program/Division to procure by competitive means:

equipment valves for the chilled water system, drain the system and then come back to re-start the chilled water system after they have done installing the AHU. This will assure the Judiciary that the entire building system is running properly after the installation. Honeywell's estimate for them to do this on a weekend is \$6,666.75 that would have to be added to the cost plus the contractors markup on this expense.

7. Explain in detail, the process that will be or was utilized in selecting the vendor/contractor/service provider:

Honeywell International Inc. is the A/C maintenance contractor on JUD contract J13006. One condition on their contract is to provide for a "satisfactory operation of the air-conditioning and ventilation system". In order to provide the District Court cell block this satisfactory operation, they recommended that The Judiciary replace the 30 year old inefficient 5 Ton AHU with a 7.5 Ton AHU which is the maximum size unit they say can utilize the existing duct size and chilled water volume that the existing 5 Ton AHU utilizes. Honeywell is also familiar with the system at District Court so the same people doing the installation of the new AHU will be able to shut down the equipment valves, drain the chilled water system, restart the chilled water system and test the entire air-conditioning system to ensure that it operates correctly. The cost for Honeywell to come in to provide this shut down over the weekend is estimated at \$6,666.75 plus contractor markup for other venders to bid on this job as has been experienced at Ali`iolani Hale and the Kapuaiwa Building where Honeywell had to be paid to come in to do the shut down. Without a Mechanical Engineering Consultant, we are relying on the expertise of Honeywell's recommendations. If we do go out for pricing, The Judiciary will be responsible for putting out the specifications or equivalent to the Honeywell's recommended replacement leaving the decision on the bidders to provide their own recommended units which may result in getting prices from bidders with different specifications.
